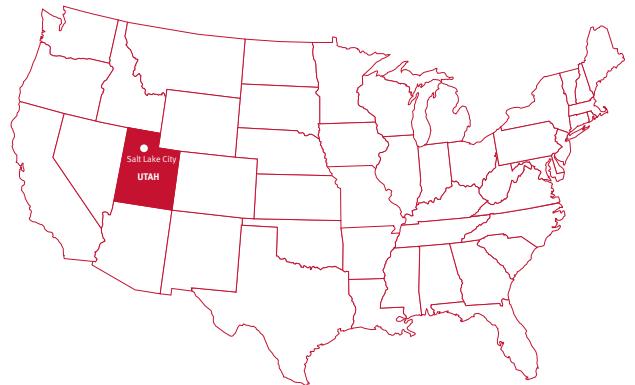
SALT LAKE CITY, UTAH

- Did you know that major corporations are located in Salt Lake City and surrounding areas—eBay, Goldman Sachs, Unisys, 3M, Novell and Discover?

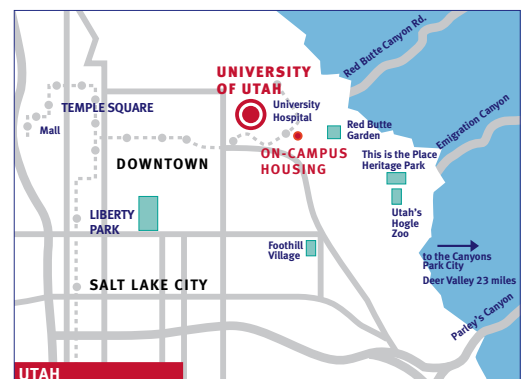


Utah is located in the Western part of the USA near the Rocky Mountains

TRANSPORTATION

The public transportation system in Salt Lake City is easy to access and FREE to students. Downtown Salt Lake City is just a 15-minute light rail ride away from the campus. The university operates a free shuttle service for all students, or students can choose to bike or walk around campus instead.

Salt Lake is a well-known ski destination, having hosted the 2002 Olympic Winter Games. Skiers continue to flock here to enjoy world-class facilities.

There are eight ski resorts within 50 miles (80 km) of the city.

CLIMATE

NOBEL PRIZE WINNING FACULTY

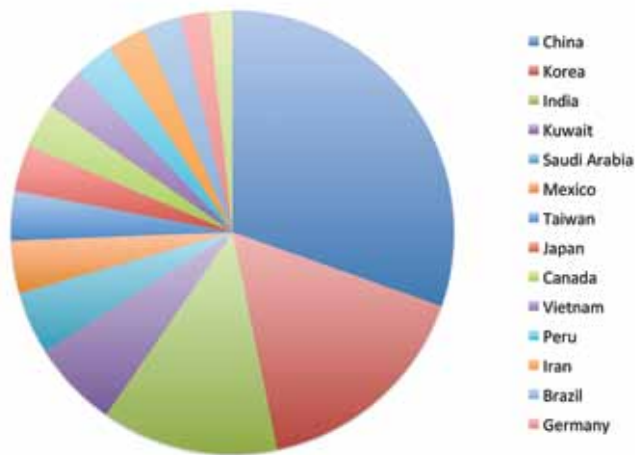
The faculty members and researchers at the University explore creative links between different disciplines in a collaborative intellectual community. Support for faculty, in the form of endowed chairs and professorships, brings some of the world's most brilliant minds (including Nobel prize winning faculty) to the University's laboratories, studios, and lecture halls. It attracts the best high-tech medical and research teams through the Utah Science Technology and Research (USTAR) initiative.

In 2007, Nobel Prize-winning geneticist Mario Capecchi of the University of Utah published a new study establishing a cause-and-effect link between the immune system and a psychiatric disorder.

A TRULY GLOBAL UNIVERSITY

Over the past five years, few public research universities have risen in stature as quickly as the University of Utah for both academic excellence and the creation of life-changing technological and medical innovation. With the urban and cultural advantages of Salt Lake City out its front door, and the majestic Wasatch Mountains and some of the world's best outdoor recreational opportunities in its backyard, the University of Utah is the state's oldest and largest public institution of higher education and currently hosts 31,000 students.

INTERNATIONAL STUDENT POPULATION OVERVIEW



Classified by the Carnegie Foundation as a research university with very high research activity (commonly referred to as a “Tier One”) and recently designated by that organization for its community engagement, the university offers degree programs through 15 colleges, professional schools and graduate schools. In addition, the university campus is home to a world-famous academic health center and teaching/research hospitals.

THE INTERNATIONAL CENTER

The University of Utah International Center provides support and advising to international students and faculty and strives to create an international and intercultural campus community. We currently serve 2,500 international students from over 100 countries and 450 visiting international faculty. International students and scholars significantly add to the diversity in our campus community.

The International Center seeks to recruit the best and brightest international students to the University of Utah and to help them feel welcome and reach their goals during their student experience. There are several international student clubs and countless student activities and organizations in which international students can participate to interact and become friends with students from Utah and all over the world. International students who graduate from the University of Utah enter the International Alumni Network coordinated by the International Center to stay connected to the campus for life. CAMPUS LIFE AND STUDENT SERVICES

THE U OF U CAMPUS

The University of Utah continues along the path of a remarkable upward trajectory, growing in both size and prominence. It leads the nation in technology transfer endeavors due in large part to the Utah Science Technology and Research Initiative (USTAR). In 2011, the University furthered its mission of excellence by joining the Pac-12, one of the country's most prestigious conferences—both athletically and academically. The future is indeed bright at the University of Utah where an environment of inspired learning and innovative discovery is awaiting the generations to come.

USTAR AT THE UNIVERSITY OF UTAH

The University of Utah and the Utah Science and Technology Research Initiative (USTAR -a long term, state-funded investment to strengthen Utah's knowledge economy) have opened the doors to the Accelerator — a new 10,000-square-foot facility that promises to give budding companies the support, space and equipment needed to develop and refine their technologies and products. The Accelerator is managed by the university's Technology Commercialization Office (TCO), which helps researchers, faculty and inventors protect their inventions and turn them into viable businesses.

STUDENT CLUBS AND ORGANIZATIONS

The University of Utah has over 200 student organizations to choose from, offering something for everyone. There are many benefits to joining a student organization: making new friends, developing new skills and abilities, working as part of a team, learning to set and achieve goals, sharing your time and talents, as well as having fun. ACADEMIC EXCELLENCE

The University of Utah is known around the globe as a place where great innovation happens. We are recognized for being a national leader for starting new technology companies from university research, the home to Nobel Prize winner Mario Capecchi and an industry pioneer in video-game design — innovation and creativity are part of our culture.

INNOVATION SCHOLAR PROGRAM

The Innovation Scholar program helps harness the power of innovation. Through a personalized road map, students explore solutions to big problems and make big ideas happen in an area of unique interest to each student. Students get recognized at graduation and on their academic transcript as being an "Innovation Scholar". Students can share their innovation portfolio with future employers, graduate schools and community leaders. Make an impact!

HONORS COLLEGE

The Honors College provides talented students with an enhanced undergraduate experience through a number of opportunities. Honors students typically enroll in one or two Honors classes each semester during their first two years. This will put you in contact with other students who set high goals for themselves, like to be challenged and are highly motivated. Rather than the large auditorium classes so many freshmen or sophomore students take, your classes will be small and you will get to know your professors well.

UROP

The Undergraduate Research Opportunities Program (UROP) provides undergraduate students and faculty members the opportunity to work together on research or creative projects. UROP provides assistantships up to \$1200 for any first-time UROP student who assists with a faculty member's research or creative project, or who carries out a project of her/his own under the supervision of a faculty member.

GLOBAL PATHWAYS GLOBAL SCHOLARS PROGRAM

If you achieve higher than a 3.5 GPA in your first semester of Global Pathways, you may be eligible for outstanding leadership and academic opportunities within the University. See your advisor for more details.



ATHLETICS AND RECREATION

The University has 18 varsity teams in National College Athletic Association (NCAA) Division 1 sports. The University of Utah's academic excellence and athletic profile makes it a great fit for the "Pac-12 Conference".

Utah and Colorado, Arizona, Arizona State, University of California at Berkeley, Oregon, Oregon State, Stanford, UCLA, USC, Washington and Washington State are official members of the Pac-12 Conference. Like the schools of the Pac-12, the U is home to National Academy Members, globally renowned experts, and Nobel Prize winners.

The U joins a conference dedicated to academic merit with particular focus on building and nurturing excellence in student athletes. Out of 372 student athletes recently assessed, 93 student athletes were eligible for the Dean's List and 208 student earned a 3.0 GPA (honor roll) or higher.



FACILITIES AT THE UNIVERSITY OF UTAH

Ray Olpin University Union is the community center of campus and complements the academic mission of the university. Traditionally considered the “hearthstone” or “living room” of the campus, today’s Union is the gathering place of the college. Through an extensive variety of cultural, educational, social, and recreational programs the Union provides the opportunity to balance course work and free time. In the Union building students can find lounges for relaxation, game rooms for entertainment and meeting rooms to do extra group studying as well as a cafeteria for a delicious meal.

The Marriott Library inspires the discovery, creation, and use of knowledge for Utah and the world. World-class resources, user-focused services, expert and responsive staff, and a technology-rich, inviting library make it the knowledge provider of choice for life-long learning. The library ranks 47 out of the 113 largest university libraries in North America.

The Einer Nielsen Field House is a 60,000 square-foot facility at the University of Utah with a 211 meter track, free circuit weights, cardio machines, two indoor tennis courts, seven handball/racquetball courts, three squash courts, a table tennis court, a dance studio, locker room/showers, saunas/whirlpools and equipment rentals. In addition, the University’s HPER Recreation Complex includes one diving and two swimming pools, eight basketball courts, two weights rooms and fitness research labs.

Other recreational facilities on campus include three outdoor playing fields, 22 outdoor tennis courts, an indoor tennis stadium with eight courts, a 10 lane bowling alley and billiards. The university also has an Outdoor Recreation Program which offers unique opportunities for students to enjoy an array of outdoor and wilderness resources in the nearby Wasatch Mountains and throughout the state.

The Student Health Center is a medical care clinic located on-campus to serve the health care needs of all students enrolled. The clinic has on-site physicians, nurses and counselors who are committed to both your physical and mental well-being.

Kingsbury Hall is the University of Utah’s historic public auditorium and serves the campus and community as a center for cultural and intellectual enrichment. Built in 1930 and located on President’s Circle, Kingsbury Hall hosts concerts, lectures, travel films, and performing arts events.

Red Butte Garden includes over 100 acres of natural areas and 18 acres of formal gardens featuring floral displays, waterfalls and fountains, hiking trails and walking paths. Year-round activities include classes, workshops, festivals, children’s programs, concerts, and tours. In the summer the garden hosts a series of popular music concerts as well as floral, sculptural, and other art exhibitions.



INTERNSHIPS AND CAREER SERVICES



ON CAMPUS EMPLOYMENT

International Students are permitted to work on campus up to 20 hours per week during the academic year and full time (40 hours per week) during a vacation semester and during breaks between semesters. Students must maintain legal status as set forth in USCIS regulations in order to be eligible for on campus work. Make sure to check with the International Center and Global Pathways to see if you are eligible to work on campus.

INTERNSHIPS

Curricular Practical Training (CPT) is work experience related to a student's major which is an integral part of the established curriculum or is done through the Cooperative Education Department. CPT allows F-1 students to work or do an internship off campus for 20 hours a week while taking classes, or 40 hours a week (full time) during vacation semesters and University breaks. Global Pathways will provide information on how to find CPT opportunities.

CAREER SERVICES

The University's Career Services assists international students with workshops on American-style resumes, finding internships in your major, and attending Career Fairs. The Engineering and Science Career Fair offers students a unique opportunity to network with a diverse group of technical employers.

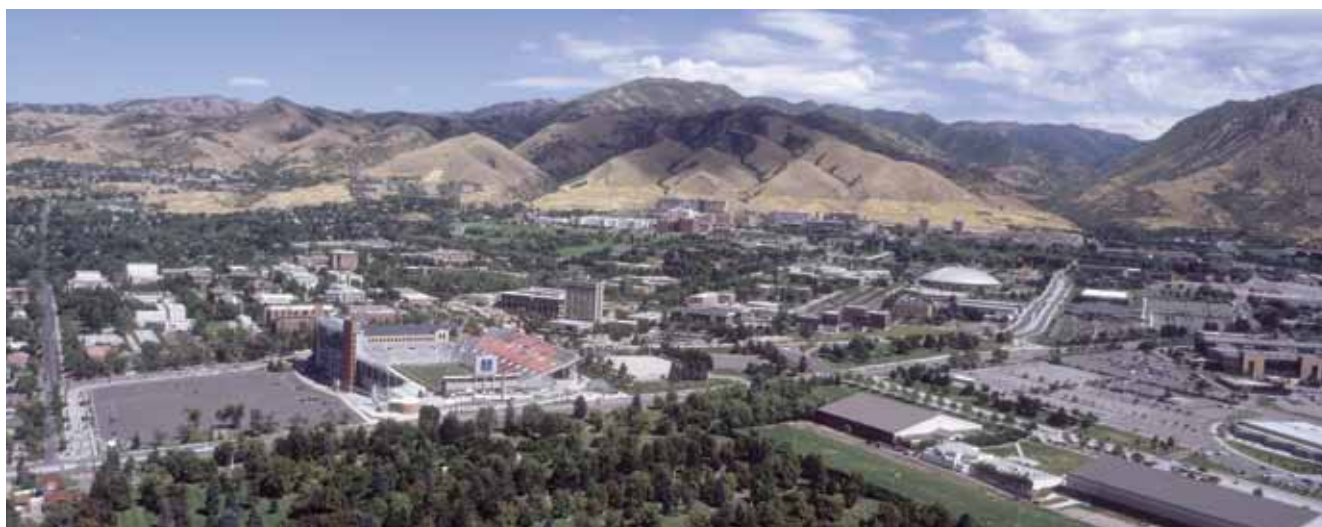

YOUR GLOBAL PATHWAYS PROGRAM

The Global Pathways staff at the University of Utah is made up of a team of specialized student affairs personnel with skills to support you as you adjust to your life in the US and the university. From the moment you arrive on campus to attend orientation, you will meet your international student advisor who will discuss with you any concerns you may have from how to succeed in a US classroom to how to buy health insurance. Global Pathways staff works in collaboration with the University of Utah to conduct orientation as well as programs for our students.



GLOBAL PATHWAYS AT THE UNIVERSITY OF UTAH

- **Top Ranked US University** - Pathways gives you an opportunity to attend a top-ranked US university for a Bachelor's and Master's degree.
- **Guaranteed Progression** - The Global Pathways Program offers guaranteed progression to the University of Utah provided you successfully complete your Global Pathways Program at the required level.
- **University-level Instruction** - All Pathways classes are taught by University of Utah professors and Ph.D. / Master's candidates.
- **Academic Advisors** - Every Pathways student will have an academic advisor to assist with the transition to their University of Utah degree program. In addition, every teacher will have office hours when students can meet one-on-one to discuss their classes.
- **Class size** - Classes are small - sometimes as few as 25 students, so you will quickly develop a good working relationship with your teachers and classmates.
- **Contact time** - The Global Pathways Program has an average of 12 teaching hours per week, so you can be sure you will get plenty of contact time with your teachers.
- **English Prep** - English classes are taught by the Department of Linguistics instructors who will prepare you to have the confidence you require to give presentations, take lecture notes, and participate in your major academic courses.
- **GRE® / GMAT® Test Prep** - Any student preparing for a Master's which requires a GMAT®/GRE® score may participate in a GMAT®/GRE® preparation course for the relevant examination.
- **Academic Coursework** - Courses are carefully designed to improve your English and provide opportunities for you to practice with Americans.

- **University Student Life** - Global Pathways students have access to the university's facilities so you are treated as a University of Utah student from your first day on campus.
- **Wide-range of Academic Programs and Subjects** - Students will have the choice of pursuing an undergraduate Bachelor's or graduate Master's degrees from the School of Business (MBA/MS Finance), Master's in Public Administration, Master's of Science in International Affairs and Global Enterprise, and Economics.
- **Flexible start dates** - The Global Pathways Program has three start dates a year in Spring, Summer and Fall – so you can choose a date that perfectly fits your study plan.
- **Attendance** - You are expected to prepare for and attend all classes and study sessions.

IMMIGRATION

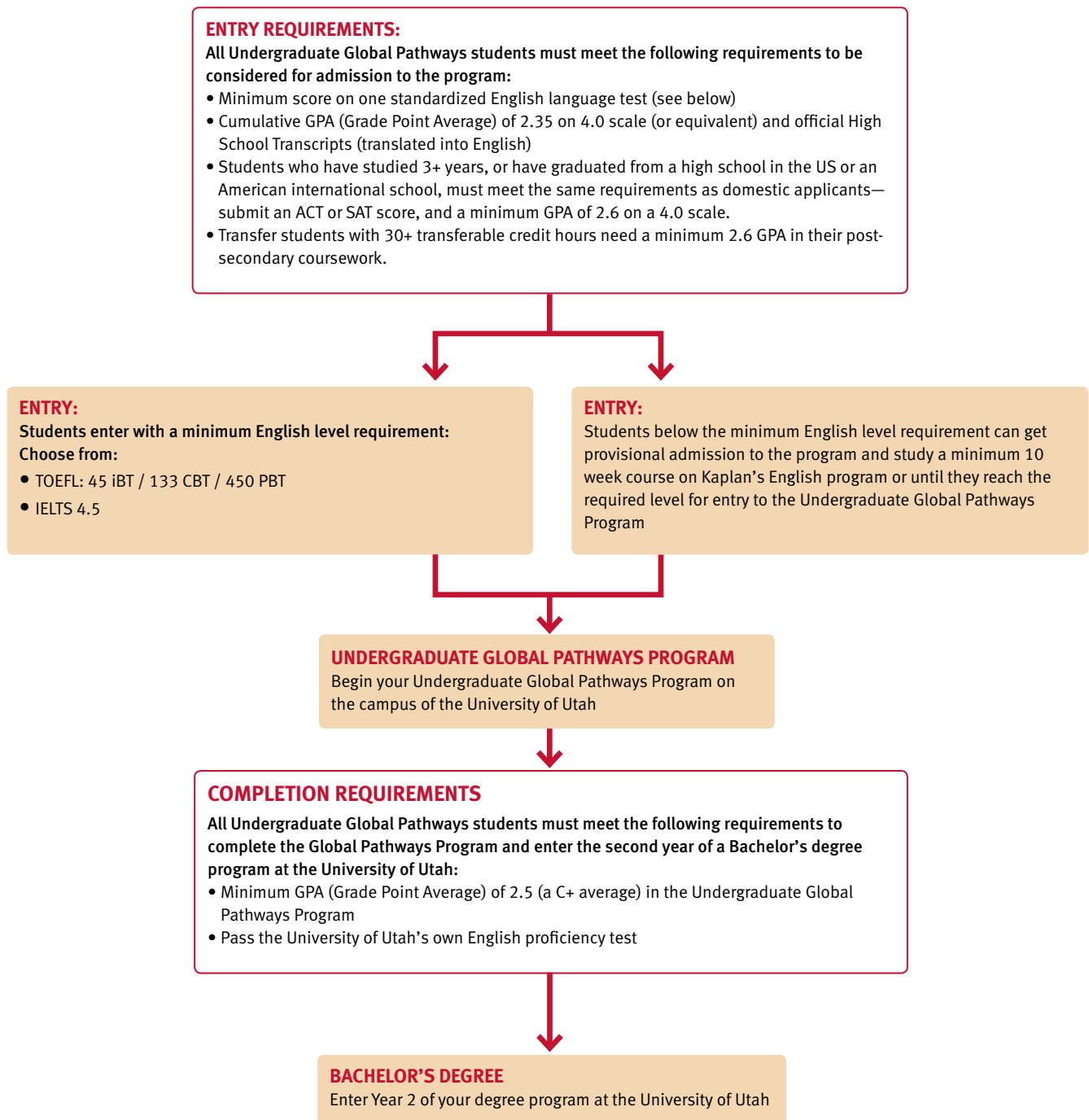

UNDERGRADUATE PROGRAM CURRICULUM

SEMESTER 1:

Integrating Language Skills for ESL

Emphasis on improving language skills in four different areas: 1) Improving listening and note-taking skills through listening to academic lectures and taking notes in class 2) Developing effective strategies for improving reading skills 3) Reviewing grammatical structures in English that often prove troublesome to second language learners 4) Improving oral skills by giving presentations in class, participating in role plays, and completing classroom projects with a partner or interactively in a group.

Outcomes:

- Note-taking skills
- Effective reading strategies
- Better knowledge of English grammatical structures
- Oral presentation skills

Advanced Grammar and Editing Skills

Emphasis is on the review of sentence-level grammar in personal writing. This course provides background and an essential foundation for the subsequent courses that satisfy the University's Lower Division General Education Writing Requirement (WR).

Outcomes:

- Learn important grammar rules in English
- First half of the semester: verb tenses, subject and verb agreement, articles, etc.
- Second half of the semester: sentence types, sentence structures, etc.
- Write grammatically correct and correctly punctuated compound and complex sentences.
- Be able to identify and correct common grammar problems.

Academic ESL Through History

Content-based ESL course focusing on integrating language, content, and learning strategies in the acquisition of academic English. Uses content in American history and civilization (HIST 1700) as the basis for developing academic language skills.

Outcomes:

- Improve academic reading and listening skills
- Develop knowledge in American history
- Expand existing vocabulary
- Learn how to compare/contrast things/people/events effectively
- Practice speaking during class discussions and presentations



SEMESTER 2:

Introduction to Expository Composition

Emphasis is on expository essay writing. Prerequisite skills for this course are provided in Advanced Grammar and Editing Skills. This course is designed to address the needs of non-native speakers of English, and covers the first half of the material necessary to satisfy the University's Lower Division General Education Writing Requirement (WR).

Outcomes:

- Write an essay with the following features: relevant topic, limiting thesis statement, well-developed paragraphs, and proper essay format.
- Use the following aspects of the writing process: multiple drafts, peer reviews, independent revision for organization, and editing for sentence-level grammar.
- Write the following essay types: example, compare/contrast, cause/effect and argument.
- Control the following elements: sentence structure (e.g. subject-verb agreement, article usage, etc.), sentence type (e.g. simple, compound, complex, etc.) and stylistic elements (e.g. word choice, word usage, etc.)

Teaching and Learning across Languages

This course brings together native and non-native speakers of English to explore the theory and practice of communication across languages and cultures. It fulfills both the Diversity and Humanities Exploration general education requirements and meets with the Cross-Cultural Communication course (ESL 3600 and LING 1600/3600).

Outcomes:

- Increase understanding of cultural issues that influence the effectiveness of communication
 - Enhance appreciation of the diverse ways of communicating in different cultures
 - Apply analytical skills in examining intercultural interaction
 - Consider techniques for improving intercultural communication within various types of environments
- * In addition you will also choose two regular academic courses**

SEMESTER 3:

Advanced Expository Writing

Emphasis is on writing 7-8 page expository papers with citations. This course is designed to address the needs of non-native speakers of English. Introduction to Expository Composition is a prerequisite to this course. Advanced Expository Writing finishes the material necessary to satisfy the University's Lower Division General Education Writing Requirement (WR).

Outcomes:

- Develop skills of summarizing, analyzing, and synthesizing both academic and professional writing.
- Learn various rhetorical and research strategies, especially as they relate to the construction of extended formal arguments.
- Become familiar with the Marriott Library and learn how to gather information from a variety of sources, including books, journals, the Internet, and other reference material.
- Develop a greater awareness of your own attitudes and learn to think critically about the world that surrounds you.
- Learn to use proper citations (i.e., summarize or quote another author) and create bibliographies in the APA format.

GRADUATE GLOBAL PATHWAYS

More than five decades have passed since the first Ph.D. degree was earned at the University of Utah. Now there are Doctoral and Master's degree programs in more than 90 areas. A number of programs unite disciplines and cross departmental and college lines. Founded in 1850, the University of Utah is classified as a comprehensive research university among 3,400 US institutions.

ENTRY REQUIREMENTS GRADUATE GLOBAL PATHWAYS *

- Bachelor's degree or equivalent from an accredited institution of higher education;
- Minimum GPA (Grade Point Average) of 3.0 or better on a scale of 4.0 in cumulative undergraduate work and;
- Minimum English level score of TOEFL® 500 PBT / 61 iBT, or IELTS 6.0.
- MBA requires minimum 2 years of professional working experience, and MPA prefers 1 year work experience or internship.

GRADUATE PROGRAM COURSE DESCRIPTIONS

Advanced communications skills for graduate students

An advanced integrated skills course designed to improve reading, writing, speaking and listening skills through note-taking, writing short essays, and giving oral lectures and presentations in class. Assumptions and interactions practices of the American classroom are emphasized.

Outcomes:

- Reading, writing, speaking and listening
- Interaction with other graduate students
- Presentation skills in specific disciplines

Advanced Pronunciation and oral skills for graduate students

Focus on the development and fluency of oral skills. Intensive pronunciation practice and instruction for non-native English speakers. Emphasis on the features of English pronunciation that have the greatest effect on intelligibility.

Outcomes:

- Develop abilities to listen to and analyze the sound of speech in English.
- Learn which aspects of speech can help or hinder understanding.
- Monitor your own speech focusing on form and accuracy.
- Analyze and produce appropriate stress and intonation patterns for typical classroom and campus discourse settings.
- Understand common word stress patterns and apply them to terms in your field of study.
- Identify and improve your own areas of difficulty in pronunciation.
- Participate in activities which are designed to make your accent more understandable.
- Gain experience in speaking English in conversation with your classmates and in a presentation to the class.
- Make a personal plan for continued pronunciation improvement beyond this course.



Graduate Writing 1

Focus on the development of the writing process for specific fields of study and research skills. This course has a heavy emphasis on writing in an American University and the practices and assumptions made about research, citation, style and form.

Outcomes:

- Write an essay with the following features: relevant topic, limiting thesis statement, well-developed paragraphs, and proper essay format.
- Use the following aspects of the writing process: multiple drafts, peer reviews, independent revision for organization, and editing for sentence-level grammar.
- Write the following essay types: example, compare/contrast, cause/effect and argument.

TRANSFER CREDITS

All students who have attended a recognized post-secondary college or university need to submit all transcripts from those institutions in their application. Any international student who begins academic studies at another college or university and completes at least one year of satisfactory work (30 semester hours or 45 quarter hours) will be evaluated as a transfer student and must have a 2.60 GPA in their post-secondary coursework to be admissible. It is a requirement for students to disclose this information at the time of application. If a student has transfer credit and would like to see if those courses can fulfill major requirements, they may be required to obtain course descriptions and/or syllabi.

1. LEARN ABOUT THE PROGRAM

Talk with one of the Global Pathways representatives in your country. Contact utahpathways@kaplan.com and we'll make an introduction for you.

2. SEND IN YOUR COMPLETED APPLICATION

Request an application form from your local Global Pathways representative, or online at www.global-pathways.com. Be sure your application is complete by the application deadline and has all required documents including your English test score and secondary school and/or college transcripts. Our representative in your country will guide you through the entire process.

3. RECEIVE CONFIRMATION OF RECEIPT

After we receive your completed application, we'll send you confirmation of receipt by email. Upon acceptance, a visa eligibility document (Form I-20) will subsequently be issued by the University of Utah to eligible applicants.

4. BEGIN YOUR VISA APPLICATION PROCESS

Allow approximately 6 weeks for your US visa to be processed once the US embassy or consulate has received your completed visa application and payment. You can get help with the visa process from one of our local representatives in your country.

5. ACCEPT OFFER WITHIN 30 DAYS

To secure your place in the Global Pathways Program, you will need to accept your offer by paying a deposit of US\$1000 within 30 days of receiving your offer details. Payment can be made by bank draft, electronic transfer or credit card. If you do not receive a visa, your deposit will be refunded.

6. PAY FULL TUITION AND FEES

Once you have secured your visa, you must pay (by bank draft, bank transfer or credit card) tuition and fees for the Global Pathways Program prior to your arrival in the US.

7. RECEIVE PRE-ARRIVAL GUIDE

We will send you all the information you need such as where you're staying and what to pack so you can prepare for your trip. Your Pre-Arrival Guide will also outline important dates such as when you can move in to housing, the orientation schedule, and when classes start so you can plan your flight accordingly.

8. ARRIVE IN SALT LAKE CITY AND ATTEND ORIENTATION

The orientation program will help you with the transition from your home culture to the University of Utah environment. You'll get to meet your fellow Global Pathways students and be introduced to the university and the city of Salt Lake!

TERMS AND CONDITIONS

GLOBAL PATHWAYS GENERAL TERMS & CONDITIONS

1. Rules and regulations: Global Pathways students are required to comply with and are subject to the rules and regulations governing the University of Utah.

2. Arrivals and departures: Homestay accommodation is booked from the Sunday before the orientation start date until Saturday morning 4 weeks later, unless otherwise advised. A partial week may be counted as 1 week's accommodation. If a student arrives before Sunday, the student may be charged for extra nights. On-campus housing accommodation dates are determined by the Housing and Residential Education (HRE) office at the University of Utah. Contact the Global Pathways office for more detailed information.

3. Late arrivals, vacations and absences: If you join the Global Pathways Program after it has started or are absent during the program, no refund will be made for the time missed. Periods of absence cannot be made up with a free extension of the course.

4. Public holidays: Classes are normally not held and most school facilities are closed on national holidays. Compensation will not be made for classes not offered at the University of Utah due to the aa 3, Nov 22-23.

5. Prices: Global Pathways has the right to change prices due to tax increases, governmental actions or other events beyond Global Pathways' control. Prices are valid for programs starting in January, May and August.

6. Books and learning materials: All books and learning materials need to be purchased by the students upon arrival at the University of Utah.

7. Non-credit courses: Students who wish to register for non-credit courses will be required to pay for the course fees and special fees themselves. Non-credit courses offered through AOCE are not covered in the Global Pathways tuition.

8. Residential housing deposit: If there is damage, loss or extra cleaning needed for a student's on-campus residential accommodation, the University of Utah's Housing and Residential Education (HRE) office may require the student to pay for these charges. Payment for these charges is the student's sole responsibility, and these fees should be paid directly to HRE. An on-campus accommodation deposit fee of up to US\$500 is due before arrival. The deposit fee will be applied toward the on-campus accommodation bill. This deposit includes the reservation and cancellation fee and is non-refundable if the student cancels their on-campus housing after the cancellation deadline. Contact the Global Pathways office for detailed information on each semester's on-campus housing cancellation deadlines.

9. Expulsion/ suspension: Any student who commits a criminal offense, violates the student conduct code, has a very poor attendance record or fails to pay an amount he or she is directly or indirectly liable to pay in order to undertake the course, may be expelled or suspended. No refund will be given and immigration authorities will be informed.

10. Cancellations and Refunds policy: The cancellation/refund policy stated in this brochure shall govern all refunds relating to the Global Pathways Program. This policy, and not the University of Utah's general refund policies, shall govern refunds. Students who must cancel their participation in the Global Pathways Program due to visa denial shall be entitled to full refund of all amounts paid for participation in the Program. Any student who voluntarily cancels their participation in the Global Pathways Program and/or fails to complete the three semester Program (or two semester Program for graduate students) shall forfeit their accommodation placement fee, \$1000 tuition deposit, and enrollment fees (which are all non-refundable). In addition, students who voluntarily cancel their participation in the Global Pathways Program and/or fail to complete the three semester Program (or two semester Program for graduate students) will forfeit all tuition paid unless written notice of cancellation is provided at least 30 days prior to the start of the first semester classes. See the following schedule:

Refunds will be made via the Global Pathways representative to whom the fees were originally paid, or to the student's bank account in the same country and currency in which the fees were originally paid. All refunds (if applicable) will be made within 45 days of written notification.

11. Accommodation refund policy:

Homestay: Students who complete 50% or more of a homestay booking shall not be entitled to any refund of homestay fees paid. Otherwise, students who provide timely written notice of intent to terminate shall receive a refund of the unused accommodation fee less the homestay placement fee (USD\$200) and less a cancellation fee equal to four weeks worth of accommodations.

On Campus Housing: Refunds for on-campus housing are governed by the University's housing policies and procedures. Contact the University of Utah's Housing and Residential Education office directly concerning refunds.

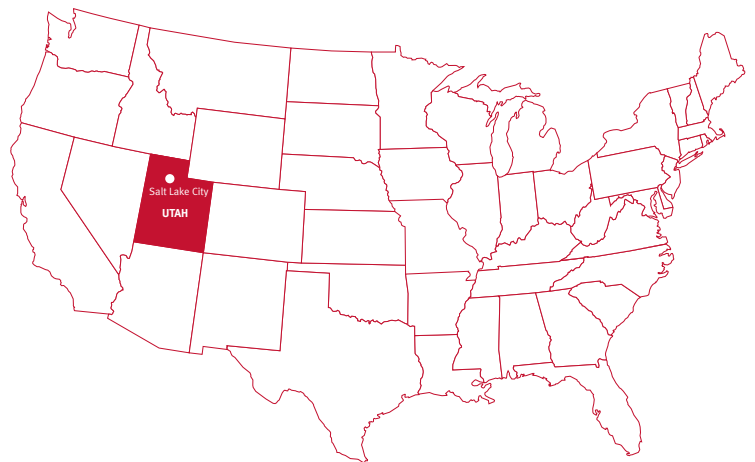
